1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Curricular aspects are the mainstay of all Higher Education Institutions. An affiliated college is a teaching unit which depends on affiliating University for its academic and curriculum process. The college strives to introduce courses that are in tune with the emerging national and global trends and relevant to the local needs. The college has gradually expanded its ambit by introducing PG courses, Career Oriented Courses (COC), relevant Diploma courses, Foreign Language, etc. The Vision, Mission and Objective of the college clearly points towards a value based, education based on the curriculum of the affiliating university combining it with the core values emanating from the philosophy and teaching of J. Krishnamurti and Annie Besant. The semester system was introduced by Banaras Hindu University a few years back. The college has successfully implemented the semester system, internal evaluation, online feeding of marks etc. and all UG/PG courses are running under Semester System as stipulated by UGC/BHU. The focus is on skill development, career oriented programs, industry visit, industry - academic interaction and college has brought all these aspects under curriculum implementation and enrichment. Special attention is given to weak students especially belonging to SC/ST, OBC (non-creamy layer) and minorities through formal and informal Remedial Class taken from time to time. In curricular planning and implementation, the college has some role in curriculum designing as faculty members of some departments are invited to discuss syllabus revision, curriculum updating, Board of studies, etc. The Principal of the college is a member of Academic Council which is the final authority to approve the courses. College tries to implement the curriculum within the overall framework provided by the university. On the other hand institutional goals and objectives are taken care of while implementing the curriculum. All data regarding internal examination and external examination is as per the record of Banaras Hindu University. Although there is no CBCS system, the college follows the Choice Based Basket System for the UG/PG Courses prescribed in the University Curriculum, in which the students opt different papers from the Choice Based Basket System specified in the syllabus of BHU.

Feedback Obtained
<p>The college collected feedbacks from students, parents, alumni, teaching and non-teaching staff. The feedback was analysed meticulously to determine the needful actions to be taken for the overall betterment of the institution.</p> <p>•Students were fully satisfied with class-preparation, communication, teaching-approaches, internal-evaluation process, promoting-internship, teacher's student-centric and supportive approaches, preparing students mentally for the upcoming challenges, encouragement to generate interest in co-curricular activities and different soft-skills, life-skills, human-values and employability-skills. Teachers' teaching-methods and their availability during lockdown through various online-modes and LMS were also highly satisfactory to the students. Besides, the students were totally satisfied with the syllabus covered through the offline and online modes. Thus the overall quality of teaching-learning-process in the college.</p> <p>•The library-facilities were satisfactory too, such as: accessibility to books and e-resource, standard of journals and magazines of the library, computer literacy program conducted by library, cooperation of library-staff, and quality of library-services.</p> <p>Besides, students marked their satisfaction in the functioning of the internet</p>

inside the library also. •Students were also highly satisfied with the cleanliness inside the college buses and the behaviour of bus-staff, and also very satisfied with the availability of seats in the college-bus. •The cleanliness, arrangement and the menu and rates of the canteen were highly satisfactory to the students. Besides, they are also satisfied with the quality of food and canteen-staff. •Students were highly satisfied with the electricity and generator facility, availability of dustbins in the campus and very satisfied with the hygiene, cleanliness and condition of toilets and the first-aid facility. They were also satisfied with the drinking water facility in the campus. Parents of the students were highly satisfied with admission-procedure, teaching-methods and standard, students-teacher relationship, college-administration, library-facilities, classroom, examination-system and result-declaration. They were satisfied with career-guidance, bus, internet Wi-Fi, washroom and hostel-facilities. Alumni of the college feel proud being alumna of this institution and were highly satisfied with courses, infrastructure, teaching-faculty, library and office/support-staff. Most of alumni suggested their friends/relatives to take admission in their alma-mater and they are mostly willing to contribute for college-development. Teachers were satisfied with teaching-workload, college-infrastructure, student's punctuality and responses. They were very satisfied with semester-system and its implication, facilities of guest-lectures, workshops, internal-examination-system, mentorship in the college, space given for faculty-development-programme, library, sanitation, washrooms, general-cleanliness, cooperation from office and support-staff, disbursement of salary and circulation of information. However, they were less satisfied with Internet-facilities and have suggested more funds for library and increase in teaching posts in Education. ICT enabled classrooms and number of reference books journals should be increased, and to develop portal for MOOCs in the college. Non-teaching staff were also satisfied with workload, ICT/net facilities in the office and highly satisfied with infrastructure, teaching non-teaching relationship and disbursement of salary. However, they were less satisfied with loan-facilities welfare-schemes. Few suggestions are also given by staff such as 5-days work, half-leave implementation, use of biometric-attendance-system and a separate parking-area for them.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The College conducts two types of evaluation, one which is formulated by the Banaras Hindu University i.e., Internal assessment consisting of tests and assignment for each paper in the different disciplines and external assessment which is done at centralized level by the University. The College also follows its own internal evaluation focusing on the all-round development of the student for developing the cognitive, affective and psycho-motor abilities of the learners. For this the teachers of the various departments at their own level conduct quiz, discussions, presentations, assign projects, and give assignments to the students. The evaluation is objectively done by involving all students and their learning outcomes are displayed to encourage and enhance their qualities. In the pandemic period the assignments were collected through the various learning platforms like Google Classroom and the teaching-learning activities were stimulated by the use of online evaluation tools such as Kahoot, test-moz, Google forms, mentimeter where the students showed their enthusiastic participation.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The Academic Calendar of the college is prepared keeping in view the academic calendar of Banaras Hindu University. The Academic Calendar is framed according to the semester. For this academic session also, the Academic Calendar was prepared as ODD semester and EVEN semester. The activities in the Odd Semester and Even semesters were framed keeping in mind the enhancement of quality of teachers, non-teaching staff and students. The calendar of the odd semester started from the month of July with Admission and counselling of students at the University level. The students were introduced to various activities like Induction program, talent show, Gender sensitization, celebration of important national days, Founder's Day and their performances and initiatives were continuously monitored and evaluated. For teachers and Non-teaching Staff capacity building programs were organized in each semester. The Internal assessment was conducted continuously and comprehensively judging the learners cognitive, affective and psychomotor attributes. The schedule was prepared beforehand and the results were displayed on the notice board. For the students who could not achieve the minimum learning outcome were provided remedial teaching and then put to assessment so that they could achieve the learning goals. The Academic session ended by the semester exams conducted by the

University. The activities mentioned in the Academic Calendar were followed by the departments stringently.

The physical, academic, and support infrastructure of the institution is continuously maintained to ensure that it is of optimum service to students, as well as teaching and nonteaching personnel. The maintenance of the campus is the responsibility of staff members. To ensure proper maintenance and upkeep, there are numerous committees such as Library, Sports, Website Development, Gardening, Cafeteria, and so on. Every year, a suitable budget is set forth for the construction of various facilities. The various committees meet on a regular basis to ensure that the colleges infrastructure is being used to its full potential by students and staff. The majority of the lectures are held in classrooms. Most of the classrooms are equipped with a projector, microphone, and speakers. This is to ensure that innovative audiovisual pedagogical techniques are used during the teaching process, as well as the use of open classrooms for lectures. To ensure that the labs, including the computer centre, run well, the college employs a Technical Assistant, Lab Assistants, and Lab Attendants. The J. Krishnamurti Study Center with a well-equipped library is available at the College. A computer lab has been established for the use of faculty and students. The facility is extensively used by students for reading and research. The campus also has cafeteria, common room, and Gymnasium facilities. For first aid assistance, the campus has a dispensary with a doctor and nurse. There is an amphitheatre in the campus where a plays are performed.

The colleges library and administrative section both are computerised. The library has been entirely digitalized and is available for use even when classes are not running. It contains internet-connected computer stations as well as extensive reading areas. The library keeps up to date on new arrivals on a regular basis. A library committee oversees the librarys operations, and numerous other committees collaborate to ensure that students have the most exposure and engagement possible, as well as access to all of the colleges resources. The colleges primary goal is to create an environmental friendly atmosphere. The College pays equal attention on students' all round development where sports is an important area. 7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

BEST PRACTICES - 1 1. PROJECT PRAKRITI OBJECTIVE:- Project Prakriti has been initiated in the college with a vision and intention of bringing various practices, being carried out to develop a sense of environmental social responsibility among college staff and students under one umbrella. At the same time, to manage the waste for beneficial purposes is another objective of this initiation. The context - Vasanta College is situated at the banks of river Ganga and the greenery in the college premises and surrounding areas needs to be maintained. Secondly, since the use of paper in the form of answer sheets, practical files, and office files etc is unavoidable in the college, there was a need to deal with the problem of bulk of paper waste. Thirdly, the adjoining localities are underprivileged, and therefore, reusable items could be donated for their use. The Practice - Project Prakriti encompasses following activities-

1. A waste segregation centre works in the campus, where solid waste is used to prepare compost and green waste is used as fodder in KFI farms.
2. Paper waste is collected and shredded in the college, collaboration is sought with an NGO Wonder out of Waste (WOW) which took the shredded paper from us and in return gave registers which are made of recycled paper. The college will give these register to students at subsidised rates (due to COVID and online mode, registers could not be used in this session).
3. In our residential campus (for students/ staff) grey water recycling project started in the first week of January 2020. The plant is discharging 5000 Liters per day which is used for plants. Rain Water Harvesting too was installed in March 2020.
4. Collection of reusable items like clothes, books etc are donates to needy people in nearby localities with the help of NSS units of the college.
5. Collection of waste material and preparing rakhis by the students of Home Science. These rakhis were tied to army persons in cantonment area, Varanasi.
6. More tree plantation and taking care of trees planted earlier at the banks of Ganga and medicinal plants are also planted in college premises at large.

Evidence of success :- Quite a large amount of success is achieved in waste segregation , paper recycling, increase in the use of reusable items, and caring the plants and trees by the college staff. The college has also constructed a compost pit in the college premises itself, as lots of leaves are easily available and used to get wasted earlier. Problem encountered and resources required:- The biggest problem which was faced after the first lot of recycled paper received, was unavailability of paper as the college was totally in online mode. Secondly, a bell press machine was required to compress the paper so that it becomes convenient to load and unload the shredded paper. The machine has to be purchased in future.

There is a constant emphasis laid on the usage of ICT and as the times are moving ahead, problems of network and connectivity issues too are gradually warding off, giving space to a number of students for learning and equipping themselves with the changing times and its norms. All the teachers are using Synchronous Learning Management System like Google and different Asynchronous LMS. Teachers are using various Quiz makers to make their teaching learning more effective. Our library is almost digitalized with various barcode and scan codes. Our Administrative block is also updated with recent office softwares. Our campus too is Wi-Fi. Evidence of Success In the last two years, there has been a constant improvement in usage of ICT tools and more and more new practices are being employed under its umbrella for making the teaching learning process easier and accessible for all. The office of our institution is also constantly getting more and more equipped with various tools of ICT which can ease the process relating to money transfers, transactions, fees payment, hostel allotment etc. Problems encountered and Resources Required Initially usage of ICT was a bit challenging as many students who were in remote areas of the country were unable to access the resources because of network issues, but with the passage of time, things relating to network improved at their ends and the teachers also recorded the lectures for students which they later attended as per the availability of internet on their ends.
